Please OPPOSE Congressional Review Act resolutions targeting state waivers on clean vehicle and engine standards

Dear Members of Congress:

The undersigned health and medical organizations are strongly opposed to efforts to improperly apply the Congressional Review Act to overturn long-standing Clean Air Act program waivers that have helped or are scheduled to help reduce emissions from a range of sectors, leading to better air quality and health protections.

The Clean Air Act explicitly allows California to adopt emissions standards that are more protective than federal requirements and requires the state to receive a waiver from EPA to implement each program. Other states also have the authority under the Clean Air Act – if it makes sense for their state and the pollution sources that impact air quality – to adopt California’s tighter limits. More than 75 waivers to adopt and implement these types of programs have been granted without issue for decades by both Republican and Democratic administrations. This option for more protective standards allows states to utilize every tool in their toolbox to improve air quality for their residents, efficiencies for businesses and other benefits.

Overturning these state pollution programs represent an infringement on states’ rights and responsibilities to protect their residents from pollution. At a time when more than 152

million people live in areas with unhealthy levels of air pollution¹, and families across the country are facing increased energy and healthcare costs, overturning waivers that have a proven record of improving air quality is dangerous. What's more, many of these waivers are already fully implemented and complied with by automakers and repealing them could lead to backsliding in technology that ends up costing consumers more at the pump.

The following on-road standards have been adopted in whole or in part by 17 states, each undergoing their own state rulemaking process with public comments, hearing and deliberation.

H.J. Res 202/H.J. Res 211/S.J. Res 206 would overturn a 2009 California rule to reduce greenhouse gas emissions from cars, light-duty trucks and medium-duty vehicles. These standards have already been implemented *and* complied with by auto manufacturers. The transportation sector is the largest contributor to U.S. greenhouse gas emissions that accelerate climate change, making disasters like wildfires and extreme heat more frequent and intense.²

H.J. Res 205/S.J. Res 207 and **H.J. Res 212/S.J. Res 208** would overturn California's "Advanced Clean Cars" program, which was established a decade ago to reduce smog-forming emissions from new vehicles by 75% through 2025. These standards have already been implemented *and* complied with by automakers. Transportation pollution contributes to premature death, deaths due to cardiovascular illness, deaths due to lung cancer, new asthma attacks in children and more.³

The following off-road standards apply *only* to California to meet ozone National Ambient Air Quality Standards and have not been introduced in other states, meaning there is little justification for Congressional action.

H.J. Res 214/S.J. Res 205 would overturn a California rule that sets standards for emissions from lawn and landscaping equipment and other small off-road engines (SORE). These engines may be small, but they now contribute more smog-forming pollution in

California than all the cars on the state's roads. The operation of a standard commercial leaf-blower produces the smog-forming emissions equivalent to driving a standard sedan 1,100 miles.⁴ These standards apply *only* to California, making this action to undo the program an encroachment on states' rights.

H.J. Res 210/S.J. Res 209 would overturn the Ocean-Going Vessels At-Berth policy, which requires ships calling on California ports to utilize shore power rather than idling engines. This policy is crucial to the health and safety of communities nearest major ports – including the largest port complex in the nation. By implementing this program, cancer risk caused by idling ship engines will be cut as local and regional air quality improves.

H.J. Res 213/S.J. Res 210 would overturn California's Commercial Harbor Craft (CHC) standards, which ensure the ongoing deployment of cleaner technologies to protect the health of those working on and living near working harbors. The CHC sector represents one of the top three cancer risks in seaport communities and contributes to California communities failing to achieve health-protective air quality standards. Fully implemented, the CHC standards would cut carcinogenic diesel particle pollution by 89%.

Abandoning health protections already met by industry ignores the reality of both health harms and industry investment and sets a risky precedent eroding states' rights and introducing federal interference into other local health policy decisions.
